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Message from the Head of School

Aloha HPA 'ohana,

I am so excited for the return of our All-School Bulletin. The opportunity for our principals and myself to communicate with you all about the happenings on each of our campuses is a highlight of our week. Among the many things to be grateful for these last few days has been the incredible weather and the receptiveness of our families, students, faculty and staff to the modifications and safeguards needed to get this semester started. We are back! Activities are happening, class trips are on, and our students are engaged and thriving.

Monday, we honored Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by not holding regular classes, but with several Upper School students engaging in community service work on the Waiaka Stream Restoration Project. Through our acknowledgment and actions, it is important for us to always appreciate the messages his selfless acts modeled throughout his life. It is also a time for us to share the work we have done and the work we have in front of us in support of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) which is driven, in part, by HPA's mission and in our June 2020 letter, *With Aloha to All Our 'Ohana: HPA's Unwavering Commitment to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion*. HPA has sent over 40 faculty, staff, and administrators to the National Association of Independent School (NAIS) People of Color Conference (POCC) each year and over 20 students have attended the NAIS Student Diversity Leadership Conference (SDLC). HPA's now hosts six student clubs on both campuses with over 50 members focused on furthering our work with DEI. HPA students are also participating in a second year of the national *Shanti Alliance* program, a cohort-based network supporting student action projects related to DEI. While we are proud of the foundation we are building, we must continue to engage in this important work.

We also want to recognize the significance of this week in Hawai'i's history — the illegal overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawai'i on January 17, 1893. We know that there is still much for us to learn and understand about the events leading up to the overthrow 129 years ago and its ongoing profound impact on the Native Hawaiian people. We have committed to engaging in that learning and in supporting our students with resources both inside and outside the classroom. To that end, we now have Hawaiian Studies as a graduation requirement and have organized opportunities to broaden students and staff recognition and discussion with guest speakers. Analogous to Dr. King's commitment to action, we are striving to deepen our learning and responsibility to Hawai'i's history.

All of this work is in alignment with and in support of our ongoing commitment to HPA's Core Values:

- Integrity: living honestly and with moral courage
- Respect: serving with kindness and responsibility
- Pursuit of excellence: striving for the highest and best result
- Wonder: being curious, appreciative, and content

Acknowledging we have potential challenges ahead, but confident we will work through them, we will move forward together, as a community-driven by positive energy and aloha for one another.

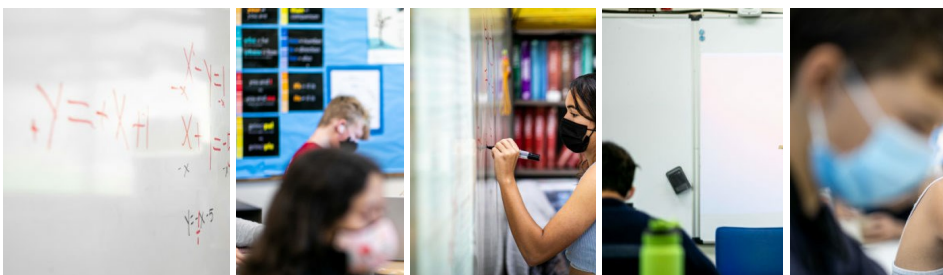

From the desk of your Po'ō Kumu (Division Principal), Ka'ai Spencer

Aloha e nā ahe lau makani! Aloha Makahiki Hou! It has been some time since our last All-School Bulletin and I would like to open by saying Happy New Year to everyone! This new year has surely kept us on our toes so far. The confidence and freedom we all felt at the end of the fall semester has taken some turns during the winter break and we once again find ourselves in urgent discussions centered around testing, quarantine, and tough decisions. Through it all, we have many people on campus that are working harder than ever before to keep us safe, healthy, and in school.

During the winter break, I was able to visit my parents back in my stomping grounds in Maui. My mom was the health aid at my high school and we spoke at length about the duties required of school healthcare providers in this time of COVID-19. After telling my mom about the things we ask of our Health Services team, she was amazed at the long list of things they do for the school. Our team of nurses is integral during policy discussions, caring for our residential and day students, providing guidance for our faculty and staff, and they still need to care for their own families. On top of that, our nurses are subject to the same close contact rules as everyone else. If any of our nurses fall ill or become labeled as close contacts, their team becomes very short-handed, very quickly. My mom was the only health aid for an entire high school. There is no way she could have managed all of these duties on her own.

I share this story because we sometimes forget the importance and heroic acts of our health care providers. Please join me in sharing your aloha for HPA's Health Services Team! It is safe to say that they are all doing a job that is much more complex and demanding than the job they initially signed up for. They are tasked with a lot, and they are human. One small step that everyone can take to make their job easier is to be sure all vaccine records are up to date by uploading it into the "Immunization Requirement" on Magnus Health through myHPA. This helps the nursing team when it comes to quarantine protocols and next steps if anyone is ever named a close contact.

As we have already experienced, it is important to be ready for online learning with short notice. The teachers will do their best to communicate with all students by posting any pertinent assignment information on myHPA and sending emails to students. Students should also be sure to contact their teachers if they will need to miss classes for any reason. Two-way communications are always better for students and teachers. Therefore, encouraging your student(s) to email teachers if they are unable to attend classes is a must to maintain open communication lines.

Mahalo nui for being such a supportive and loving community. We are stronger together!

Student Life

Upper School Student Dining Reminders

Communities rely on all members to contribute in various ways. One way that a student can contribute is by following the instructions on the signs at each table in the dining area and to kindly clean up after themselves. This way, the next person coming can eat on a clean table. Additionally, by "self-busing" dishes, it allows the kitchen staff to wash the dishes and flatware right away.

The number of students permitted at a typical rectangle table is two. If two tables are pushed together, four students may eat together. This applies both indoors and outdoors.

Upper School Day Students – Sign In, Sign Out

Upper School day students are expected to sign in each day, prior to going to their first commitment. This allows the school to know who is physically on campus and who we need to account for during emergency situations.

Equally important, students should not leave campus unless first securing permission from home and that permission has been communicated to the Student Life Office. Students who are granted permission to leave campus during the academic day, need to sign out, give an approximate time of return, and then sign back in again upon returning. Not following these guidelines is a serious trust violation and is treated as such through our discipline process.

Generally, and for safety reasons, it is recommended that students stay on campus until their final commitment, including after school activities, have concluded. Exceptions include doctor's appointments or driver's license tests.

College Counseling

Urgent: Senior College Application Materials Confirmation

By Mid-January, all seniors should have confirmed that their application materials (including transcripts, school reports, and teacher recommendations) have been received by their colleges. If any documents are missing, students should notify College Counseling immediately so that our office can submit or resubmit these materials. It is the student's responsibility to confirm that their college applications are complete.

Junior Workshops and Individual Meetings

The junior spring workshop schedule is underway. In addition to attending small group workshops, all juniors are asked to schedule their first individual meeting with their assigned counselor in the month of January.

Health and Wellness

COVID-19 Vaccination/Booster Clinic

We have proudly partnered with KTA Super Stores and scheduled another COVID-19 vaccination and booster clinic on Thursday, January 27 from 3:30 to 5:30 pm at the Gates Performing Arts Center (GPAC). We will send out a separate communication to all HPA families on Monday, January 24, with the sign-up link. Stay tuned!

As we continue to modify our risk mitigations and safety procedures, we ask that you review the following updates.

Future testing

We're streamlining our protocols in response to the magnitude and volume of testing and the additional time it takes to process and receive results. Beginning Monday, January 24, we will transition to the following once-a-week testing schedule:

- All Upper School students, faculty, and staff will be tested every week on Monday, or the first school day of the week.
- All Village Campus students, faculty, and staff will continue to be tested every week on Wednesday.

Our all-school weekly screening testing applies to everyone regardless of vaccination status.

Close contact testing procedures

Please review [HPA's COVID-19 Decision Tree](#), which was recently updated to reflect the following changes.

If you are deemed a close contact and work or attend school on the Village Campus

We offer COVID-19 testing for close contacts on our Village Campus once a week on Wednesdays from 12:00 to 12:45 pm. Please park and wait at the garden for our Testing Coordinator to assist you. If you are not current* with your vaccine or booster, you will not be permitted to return to campus for in-person instruction or school events until our Health Services team has received and approved your test result.

If you do not want to wait until our weekly Village Campus testing date, you may elect to test on your own five days from your exposure date, which counts as day one. The HPA COVID-19 Response Team will email you with your exposure date when you are notified about your close contact status. We will only accept NAAT/PCR tests, which must be submitted for approval to vcinfirmary@hpa.edu.

If you are deemed a close contact and work or attend school on the Upper Campus

We offer COVID-19 testing for close contacts once a week on our Upper Campus every Monday, or the first school day of the week, from 12:15 to 12:45 pm in the lanai area between the Castle Gymnasium and Rutgers Tennis Center. Please park in the day-student parking lot closest to the tennis courts, and be aware you are only permitted on campus for testing. If you are not current* with your vaccine or booster, you will not be permitted to return to campus for in-person instruction or school events until our Health Services team has received your test result and approved it.

If you do not want to wait until our weekly Upper Campus testing date, you may elect to test on your own five days from your exposure date, which counts as day one. The HPA COVID-19 Response Team will email you with your exposure date when you are notified about your close contact status. We will only accept NAAT/PCR tests, which must be submitted for approval to infirmary@hpa.edu.

Please ensure your vaccination records are current*

As a reminder, if you have already vaccinated or recently boosted your child(ren), please provide a copy of their vaccination card by [uploading it into the "Immunization Requirement" on Magnus Health through myHPA](#).

*As of January 6, 2022, "current" is defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Hawai'i Department of Health as

individuals who have received their booster shot or have completed their primary vaccination series within the past five months if vaccinated with Pfizer or Moderna, or the past two months if vaccinated with Johnson & Johnson. Additionally, two weeks must have passed from your second vaccination dose in the primary series or seven days must have passed from your booster dose to be considered current.

Monitor for symptoms

As a reminder, if you have been identified as a close contact of a COVID-19 positive case, regardless of your vaccination or booster status, we ask that you please monitor closely for any signs of illness and notify our nurses right away if any symptoms begin to develop. Symptoms could be as mild as a slight runny nose or a faint sore throat.

Optimal masking

We strongly encourage families to purchase KN95 or disposable/paper masks for the coming weeks as these have been identified to be the most effective in fighting the spread of the Omicron variant. We are not changing our mask policy, but it is recommended that you please use a KN95 mask or a disposable/paper mask if you've been wearing only a cloth one, or that you double mask with the cloth mask over the disposable/paper mask.

COVID-19 Communications

For those families who are new to our HPA 'ohana, we want to reassure you that we will communicate with you as soon as possible if a student, faculty, or staff member tests positive for COVID-19. For those families who are returning, we want to reiterate our dedication to maintaining the health and safety of our community, and our commitment to keeping you informed. We also want to recognize that it is equally important to us that we not overwhelm our families with too many emails.

As a reminder, we will send COVID-19 Communication emails to the specific class, division, or group identified as needing immediate notification. Otherwise, all updates will appear in the 'COVID-19 Communications' section of the ['2021-2022 COVID-19 Plans & Information' Resource Board on myHPA](#). Students and families will always have access to this resource board to check daily, should they wish to. This decision was made in an effort to balance our commitment to transparency and accountability with COVID-19 notifications and our desire to limit the number of correspondence families receive daily that may not personally impact them.

New close contact tracing notification

As the number of COVID-19 positive cases has increased, so has the number of close contacts. In an effort to streamline our notification process, we will be emailing anyone who has been identified as a close contact of a COVID-19 positive case. As a reminder, we are unable to provide close contacts with details regarding who the positive COVID-19 case is or the individual's vaccination status. Contact tracing is challenging and often difficult news to hear, so we appreciate your support if you receive such a message. We ask that you please check your email prior to the start of the school day to ensure that you have not received such a notification.

To clarify, anyone with a positive COVID-19 test result will continue to get a call directly from our HPA Health Services team. Anyone deemed a close contact will receive an email with a path forward to return to campus as dictated by vaccination or booster status.

Campus Access

During this time, campus access is limited to current students, employees, essential contractors, and approved guests — all of whom have completed a daily thermal/symptom check and a screening questionnaire.

Should a family member of a student need a meeting with a faculty, staff, or administrative team member, kindly contact them so that they can apply to have you come to campus. If approved, they will then send you a COVID-19 questionnaire. From that point, security team members will be alerted to your appointment date and time, and let you onto campus.

At the Upper School, please do not park in the Day Student Parking Lot (DSPL) and walk-in without an appointment. Similarly, at the Village Campus, kindly call or email for an appointment so that arrangements can be made. Please remember, masks are required on campus at all times when indoors. As a visitor, on either campus, you will be asked for a temperature check. Mahalo for your understanding and respect for this process.

CrisisGo for Parents

It is important that all families are set up with CrisisGo, HPA's school emergency communication tool. To set up a CrisisGo SMS/Email subscription, please click on this [invitation link](#) and complete the form by adding your name, email, and cell number (this is an important step if you would like to receive an SMS message) and click on the Subscribe button. Should an emergency occur you will be alerted by email and SMS messaging. You can also locate these instructions by logging into [myHPA](#), clicking on the resource tab, and selecting the CrisisGo Safe2SpeakUp tile.

Safe2SpeakUp for Middle and Upper Students

Similarly, Middle and Upper School students received instructions during orientation on how to upload the Safe2SpeakUp app. This is a companion app to CrisisGo. It will allow the school to alert students of emergencies and enable students to communicate with us should there be any behaviors they are concerned about. Students can also locate instructions on setting up Safe2SpeakUp in myHPA.
