With our independent Capstone presentations in K-5 last week and 6-8 this week, it is clear that our students are thinking critically about how to make our school, community, and world more sustainable. Their spirit and ingenuity comes through loud and clear on a day like today. With several learning excursions taking place around the island, targeted lessons on sustainability and environmental health and preservation, and student clubs raising awareness and taking action in all three divisions — we are living our commitment to sustainability.

Our Mālama Kāiāulu model is present and living in our curriculum, our conversations, and our actions. It was great to learn that our HIAS/WASC visiting committee recognized this in their visit last week, citing evidence of a strong commitment to place-based, experiential, project-based learning, and traditions of Hawai'i, strong alignment across divisions through the Capstone Program, a Sustainability Plan that drives future campus master planning efforts, beautiful campuses with an abundance of outdoor space and creative outdoor learning spaces, and a pervasive sentiment that HPA is a safe and inclusive place to work and learn. We are very proud of this and look forward to building on this momentum!

Our systems, many of them student-driven, are beginning to sustain and grow. As we continue to balance traditional curriculum with culminating Capstone projects, students are exhibiting well-rounded learning of both depth and breadth. It is so fun to see this work develop from conversations, research and development that took place here with our people ten years ago. We are a work in progress, and that too is inspiring.

I hope everyone can take a moment this weekend to spend some time in your happy place. In order to contribute to the idea of Earth Day, we need to slow down and take stock of all the gifts around us, in order to then take action. Our students get it and are well on their way.

Lower School

From the desk of your Division Principal, Dora Kwong

Aloha Lower School families! Do you remember the last time you successfully baked a cake? Or the first time you rode a bike? How about when you mastered long division? I would bet that your ability to learn these things involved actually doing them. Perhaps failing a few times, tweaking your actions and methods, until finally you felt the satisfaction of completion. Here at the Lower School, the core of our teaching and learning program is built upon the idea that students learn best when they DO. When they have hands-on experiences to connect to the lessons and theories a learner reads and hears. That understanding is solidified through action in real world situations, through project creation, and through the inquiry process. It is further underscored through reflection, process evaluation, and shared celebration.

This week's experiential learning in K-5 classes encompassed many of these elements, with all of our learning in different stages, but with each child given the experience and opportunity to live and breathe learning goals by DOING. Whether in literacy, mathematics, art, science or interdisciplinary work, experiential learning takes many forms. Starting with our youngest learners, kindergarten students took their first class field trip to our bountiful Upper School garden, and visited our Energy Lab, talking all things sustainability with Uncle Willie and Mr. McKenna. They continued to strengthen their love of the earth and build their connection to our 'āina, learning about local trees and plants. Our 1st-grade class wrapped up their writing unit, with students "publishing" their writing, as real authors do, active participants in the editing and revising process, until their pieces were complete, and now proudly hung in the class for all to share. Our 2nd graders project work with landforms continued on with the next step of painting their clay creations, adding color to their thoughtful maps. They experienced a setback with the clay they first used, adding to their experience and understanding of process and how to move forward, to try, and try again.

Grades 3-5 took their experiential learning off campus today, with third graders hiking Kipuka Pu'u Hulululu. This was a chance to apply their most recent work with native birds and plants such as, koa, 'ohi'a, pilo (a member of the coffee family), pukiawe, 'ohelo, 'a'ali'i, naio, māmane, 'ākala (the native raspberry), kūkaenēnē, and 'īliahī (the native sandalwood) — one of the rarest trees in the kipuka. Our 4th and 5th-graders participated in Bioblitz, at the Pu'u Wa'awa'a 'Ohia Trail, to engage in hands-on activities related to the culture and science of our 'āina and dryland forests. Bioblitz events, in which students focus on finding and identifying as many species as possible in a specific area over a short period of time, happen all around the world. It is an opportunity to enable our young scientists to have profound experiences in the natural world and to connect with the biodiversity of our 'āina. We are grateful to be a part of this year's Bioblitz, organized by Teaching Change from the University of Hawai'i - Hilo, in celebration of Earth Day!
To wrap up this week's experiential learning, we look forward to connecting with our families at today's first annual Village Campus Sustainable

Earth Day picnic. Mahalo for all the donations for our clothing swap, as we work together to make our island, and planet, more sustainable, one action at a time.

Aloha Middle School families! Last week we talked about the importance of sharing our stories as we got ready for our 8th-grade Capstone presentations. Having been through a majority of the presentations as I write this, it is clear that Ha'ina is such an important vehicle in highlighting how our students modeled the other essential practices in our Mālama Kaiāulu model; Kuleana (responsibility), Piliina (connectedness), and Lōkahi (harmony).

We saw projects that connected our students to their peers, to students of all ages at HPA, to school and community gardens around Waimea, to NGO's on the island, to the ecosystems of the island, the moon cycles, and so much more. And we saw our student Ha'ina these projects with courage and pride in front of their peers, teachers, parents and the wider HPA community. Their support and guidance of the students through this process helped our students understand the importance of the skills they were learning and the value of facing obstacles and roadblocks with a "problem-solving" mindset.

With a bow tied onto our 5th and 8th-grade Capstones and 12th-grade showcasing next week, we will be sharing more stories from the students' projects and journey, including compilation of our Capstone projects on our Capstone YouTube channel in next week's All-School Bulletin.

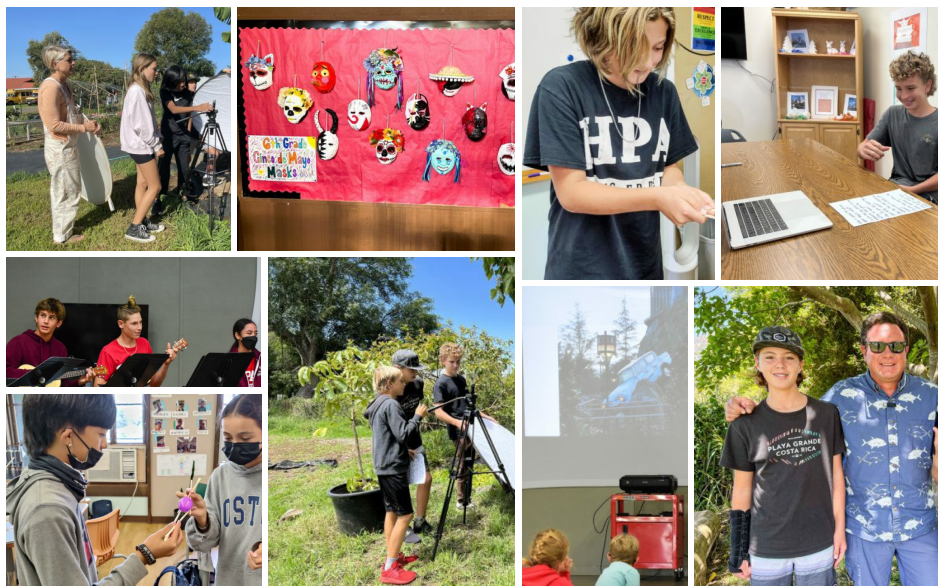

From the desk of your Po‘o Kumu (Division Principal), Ka‘ai Spencer

Aloha mai kākou e nā ahe lau makani, we are now in the season of our larger summative assessments. The presentations for our senior Capstone projects will take place next week, followed by exams for AP classes, and followed again by all other final exams and project presentations. Through it all, our student-athletes are balancing their studies with league and HHSAA championships. This can be a tough time for our students — especially if they are dealing with other challenges relating to sickness, injuries, or other unanticipated challenges.

As you may be aware, the COVID-19 virus is still amongst us and we are learning how to live with it. The number of positive cases has risen after the excitement of HPA's Prom and Olympic competitions, and I believe that while some are at home in quarantine, most would do it all over again if given the chance. The hope is to bring things as close to normal while still maintaining community health and safety. Our students have been masked up and separated for a long time and their mental health is of prime importance. Having said that, we also need to do our part to ensure our students are healthy to be able to attend their end-of-year exams and other commitments. Therefore, while we have moved to optional mask wearing for most areas of campus, we have asked our community to wear masks while they are together for larger events that take place in the GPAC theatre and Castle Gymnasium.

I hope everyone understands the difficulty of balancing the desire to return to normal with the responsibility of maintaining the safety of a school community. For those who wish that we return to the requirement of mask-wearing, the option of wearing a mask is always available. On the other hand, removing too many mitigation measures could result in a scramble to accommodate students in quarantine during final exams. It is a quandary that is difficult to manage when in the arena. Mahalo for your continued understanding and support through these unprecedented times.

On test day:

Students are expected to attend afternoon classes if they have a morning AP exam. Day students with prior parent approval will have the option to study at home on mornings that they have an afternoon AP exam. Parents must email attendance@hpa.edu and students must check-in at the Student Life Center.

After test day:

Seniors: If the senior student is passing conduct and a parent has signed the senior privileges form, they may be excused* from attending further AP classes after the completion of the AP exam. *This is in accordance with senior privileges approvals.
Freshman-Juniors: Must continue to attend classes through Thursday, May 12.

Advanced Placement (AP) Testing

AP Exams will commence Monday, May 2, and continue through Friday, May 13, 2022. A schedule of exams can be found [here](#). Exam dates and testing locations will also be posted near the exit of the dining hall by Monday, April 25. **Accommodations students will be notified of their exam schedule and locations via email.**

Students are required to arrive no later than 30 minutes prior to an exam start time.

If you are a student-athlete and have a school-sanctioned sporting event that conflicts with your AP exam test date(s), let me know as soon as possible so that you may be moved to late testing, which will be during the week of May 16-20, 2022. There are no other testing dates available.

Admissions

We are celebrating the successful conclusion of our school re-accreditation process with high scores and praise from our Hawai'i Association of Independent School (HAIS)/Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Visiting Committee. As part of HPA's re-accreditation process HPA has spent the last two years engaged in a self-study process culminating in a [2022 Accreditation Self-Study Report](#). The process culminates with a four-day visit from a Visiting Committee, which occurred April 10-12, followed by a presentation and final report with a list of commendations and recommendations and where HPA is rated on 16 different indicators. We are pleased to announce that HPA received "Effective" or "Highly Effective" ratings on all 16 indicators, as well as the self-study process! We will now take the committee's recommendations and use it to build out the school's new Future Planning document for HAIS/WASC approval. A big mahalo to all of the members of the accreditation self-study committees, and those faculty, staff, students, parents, and board members who took the time to provide input through our surveys and attend accreditation events.

COVID-19 Communications

We will send COVID-19 Communication emails to the specific class, division, or group identified as needing immediate notification. Students and families will always have access to this resource board to check daily, should they wish to. This decision was made in an effort to balance our commitment to transparency and accountability with COVID-19 notifications and our desire to limit the number of correspondence families receive daily that may not personally impact them.

Campus Access

During this time, campus access is limited to current students, employees, essential contractors, and approved guests — all of whom have completed a daily thermal/symptom check and a screening questionnaire.

Should a family member of a student need a meeting with a faculty, staff, or administrative team member, kindly contact them so that they can apply to have you come to campus. If approved, they will then send you a COVID-19 questionnaire. From that point, security team members will be alerted to your appointment date and time, and let you onto campus.

At the Upper School, please do not park in the Day Student Parking Lot (DSPL) and walk-in without an appointment. Similarly, at the Village Campus, kindly call or email for an appointment so that arrangements can be made. Please remember, masks are required on campus at all times when indoors. As a visitor, on either campus, you will be asked for a temperature check. Mahalo for your understanding and respect for this process.
