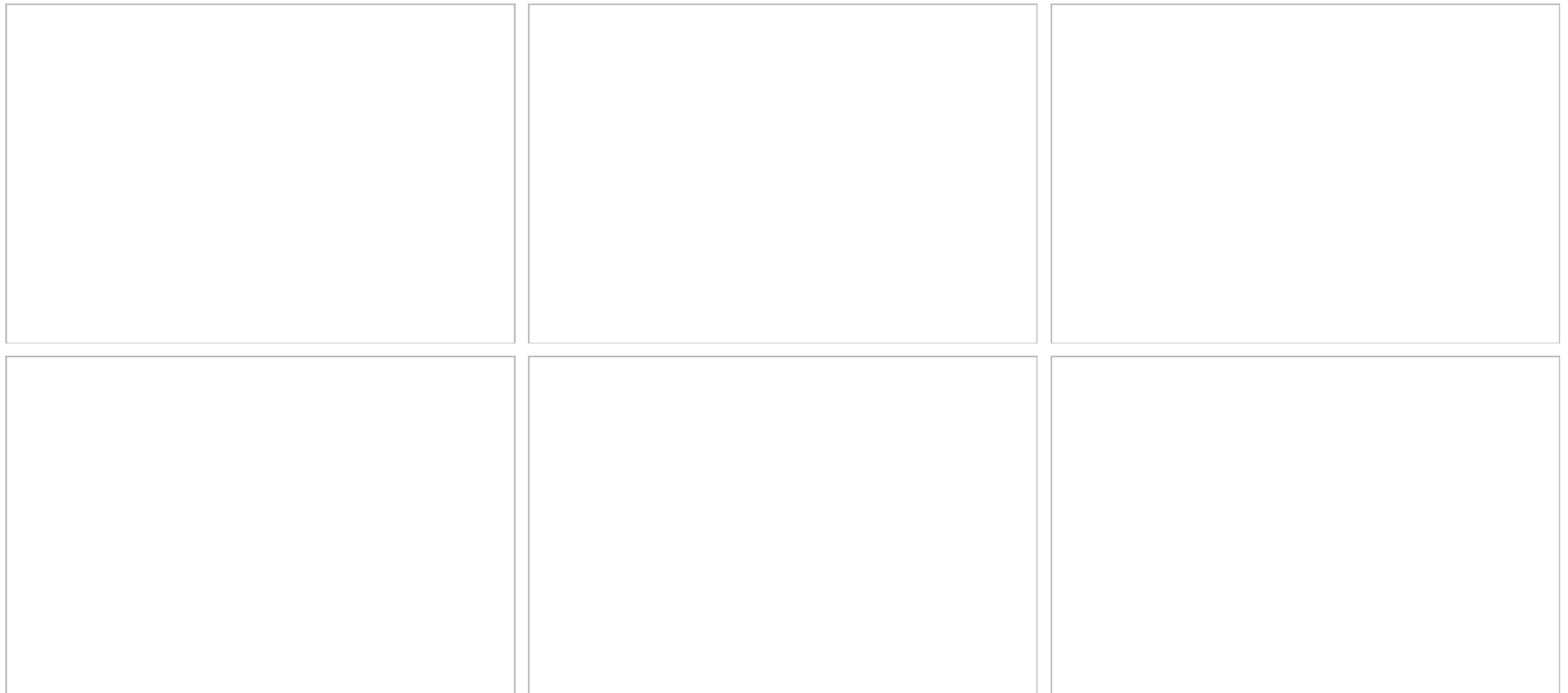

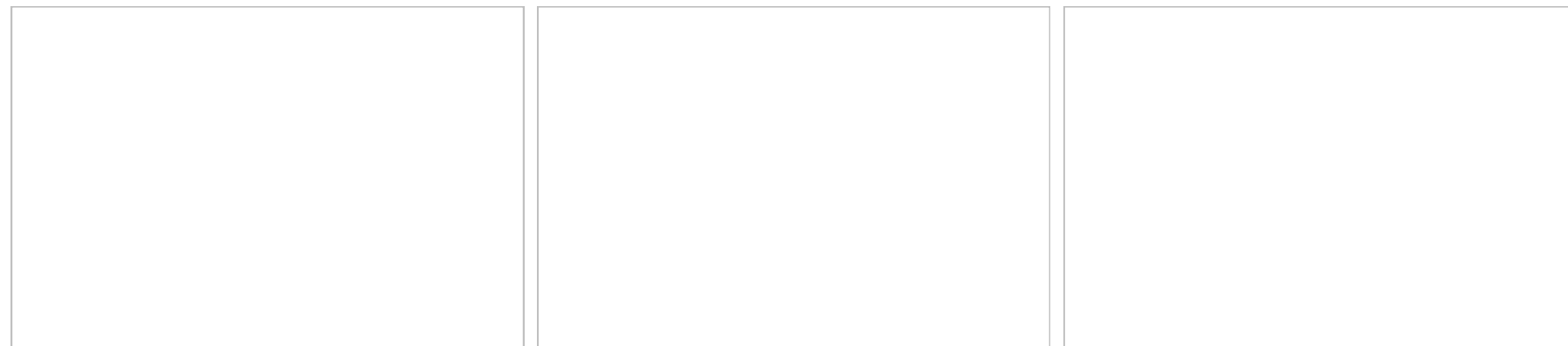

Last Sunday, Coach T led the resurgence of our annual Keiki Triathlon in our K-5 division. What a wonderful display of determination and grit as our students navigated the pool, the always difficult grass bike course, and then capped it off with some laps around the track. The energy and effort our students put into the preparation and then the event is such a healthy process for kids to go through. I do apologize for not warning many of the parents on how much exercise this event requires from you!

Today, our Capstone Showcase season draws to a close and once again, it did not disappoint! **HPA's Capstone Program** is a sustained-inquiry, interdisciplinary project that serves as a culminating academic and intellectual experience for students, and represents the pinnacle of learning experiences achieved at the end of each division (grades 5, 8 and 12). Ma ka hana ka 'ike (by doing, one learns) reflects the pedagogical approach we take to challenge students to become actively engaged in their own learning. Led by Capstone Coordinators Dagan Bernstein '97 and Greg McKenna, and facilitated by our Capstone teachers, students engage in a deep inquiry of their own personal passion areas in order to gain subject-area expertise in their respective topics of inquiry. Students begin with a passion topic, build problem statements and research questions, develop proposals and project timelines, collect and analyze data, create products, and present their work in a public setting. Our student Capstones also emphasize service and community and ultimately create student change agents. From Chloe Delos Santos' ('22) project focused on promoting the use of indigenous crops of Hawai'i in schools dining systems to Olivia Friedman's ('26) investigating and sharing ways that our school community could be more inclusive to Kaden Geesey's ('29) efforts to protect Anchialine ponds at Kohanaiki and keep people safe from bacterial infections. We couldn't be more proud of our students and more grateful to the teachers of all grade levels who worked to prepare the students for this moment.

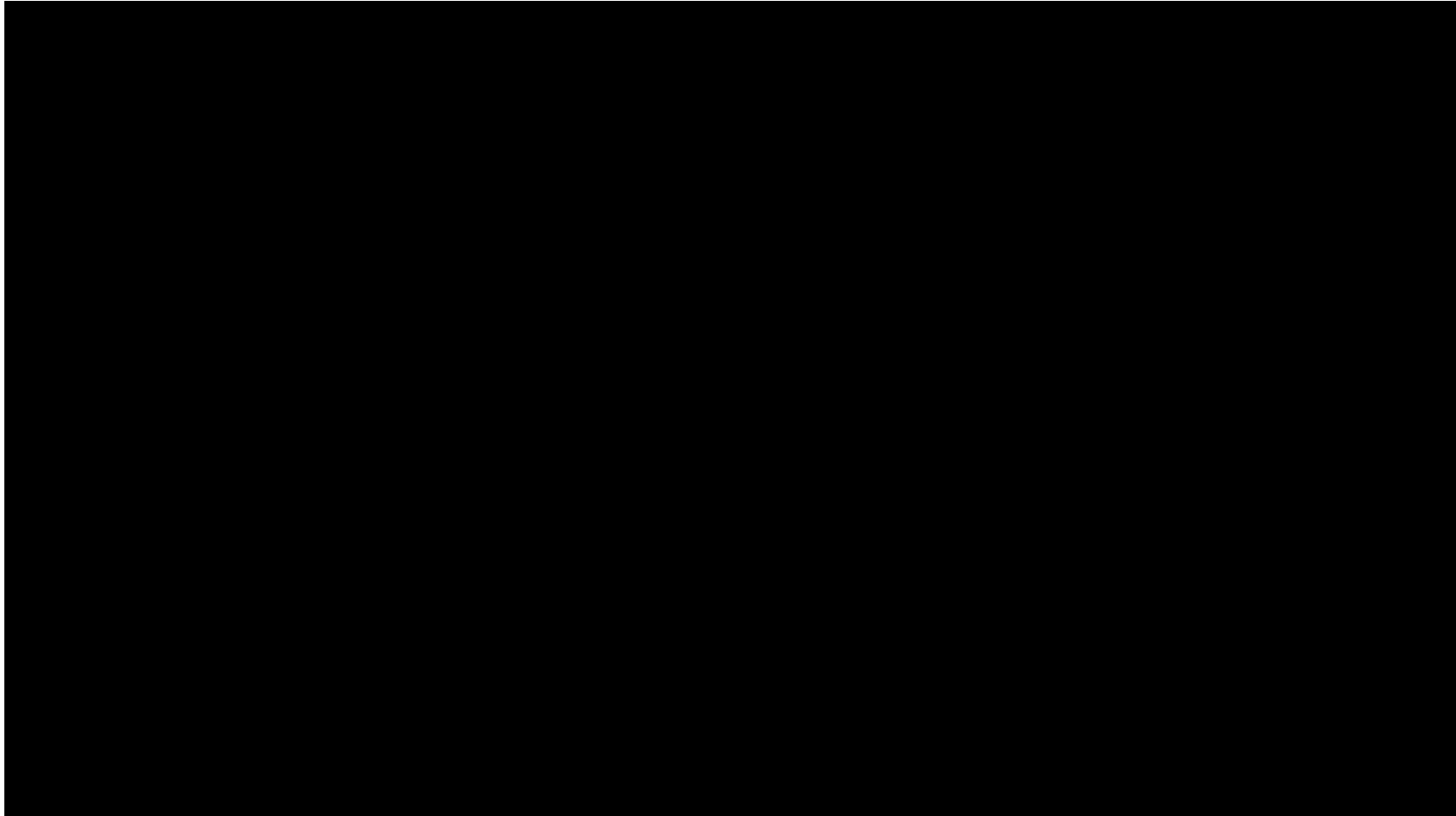

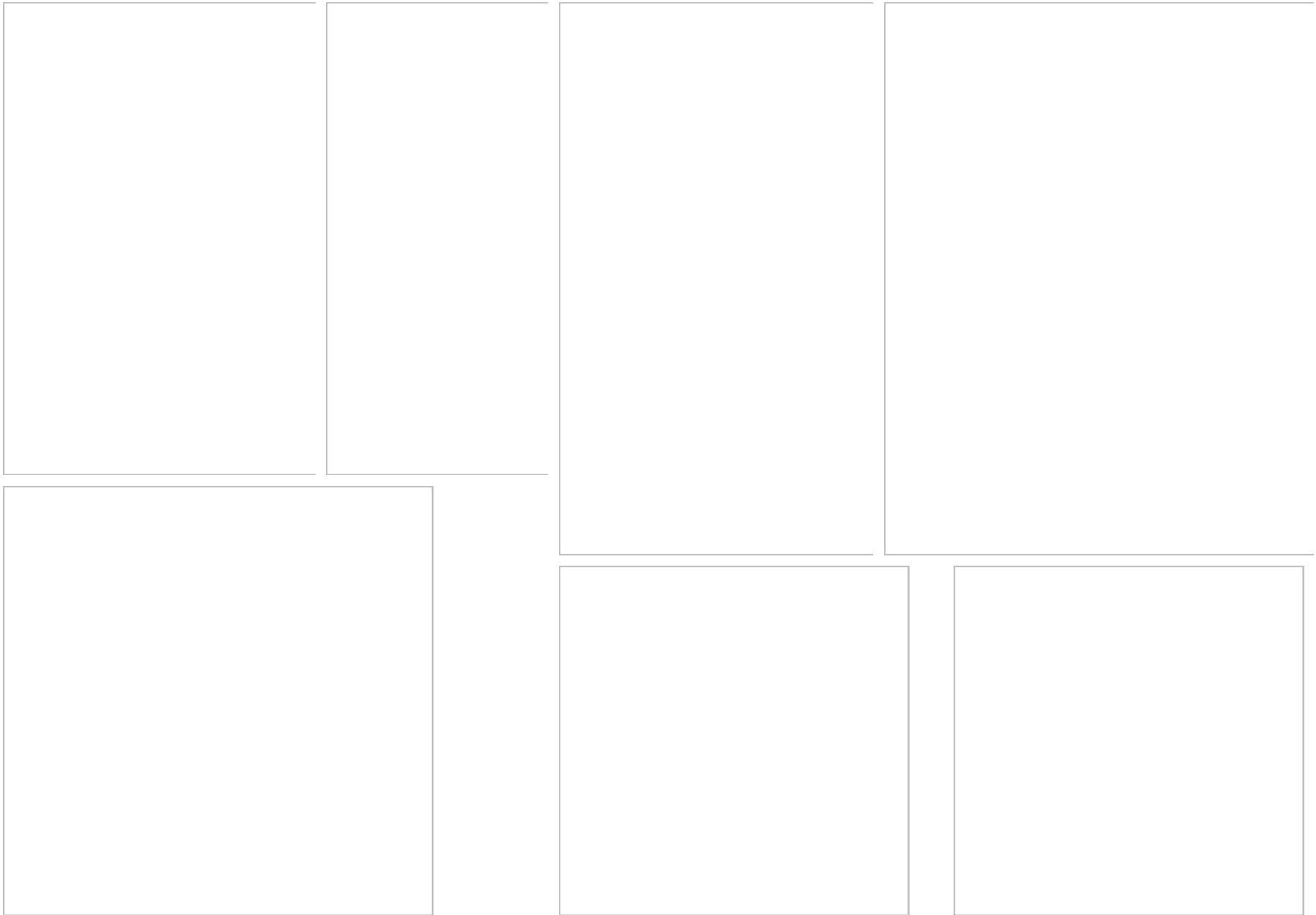
As we look forward to the 8th-grade Transition Ceremony on Wednesday, May 18, please note that each grade 8 student can have two guests to attend the ceremony.

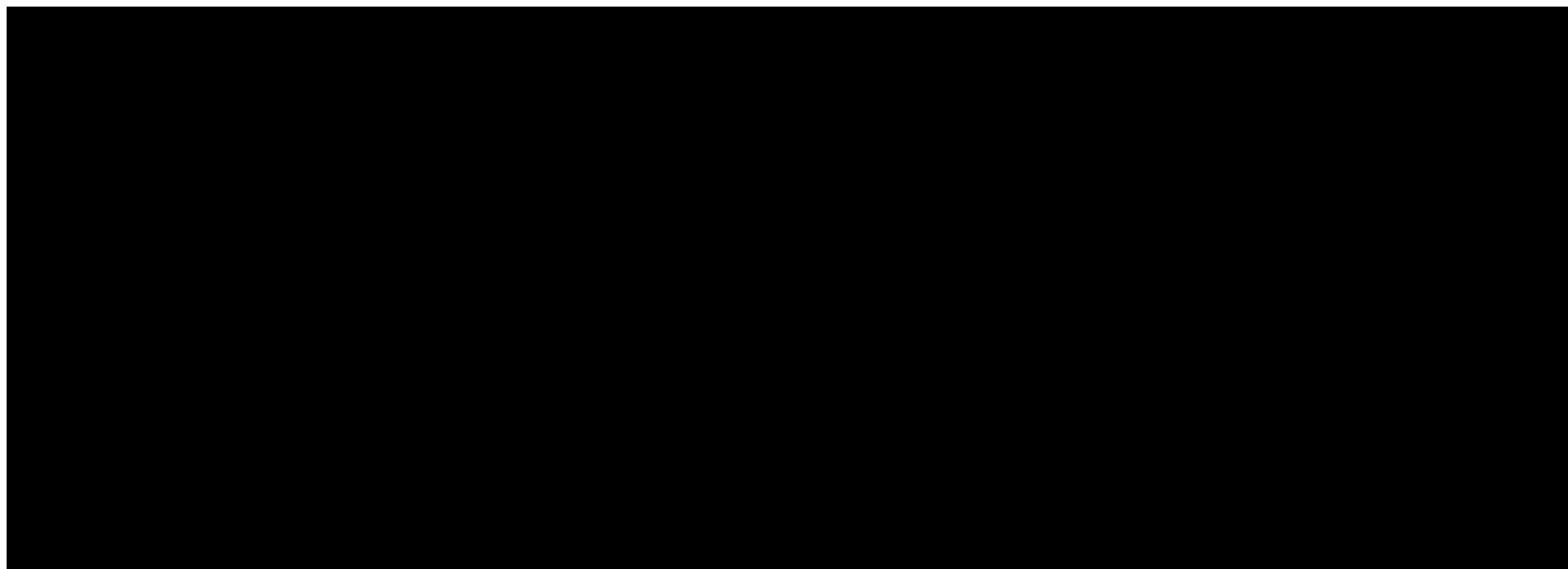

Aloha mai kākou e nā ahe lau makani, one of the major milestones of an HPA’s students’ academic journey is the completion of their senior year Capstone project. The long-term nature of the Capstone program encapsulates a myriad of skills that students learn throughout their tenure as a student. The hot spot of the week was focused on the stage of our GPAC theatre where all of the Capstone projects have been individually featured. The topics cover a broad variety that ranges from food security, legislation, cultural practice, sustainability, emotional wellness, and so on. Knowing that many of our senior students have been anxious about their time on stage, it has been extremely inspiring to see all of their hard work on full display.

In order to assist our younger student population with ideas and inspiration, teachers have been asked to set aside at least one of their classes during this week to serve as members of the capstone viewing audience. This sustained inquiry Capstone endeavor is something all of our students are required to complete as part of their graduation requirements during their senior year and it was nice to see so many of our younger students watching the presentations while their own ideas run wild in their minds. This opportunity to view the work that has been done by the senior class will surely establish a culture of excellence as the next generation of Capstone projects begin to take root.

The Capstone project is something that also takes place during the fifth and eighth-grade years. It is a defining point of HPA’s curriculum alignment which allows ample space for each student to infuse their own individual stamp. The students in the eighth grade have also completed their capstone presentations and it is a fitting step toward establishing a culture of understanding that each of their major transition years will be accompanied by a major project. The eighth-grade students will be visiting the Upper Campus next week and I look forward to learning more about their project ideas, classes they are looking forward to, as well as things that might have them a bit anxious about the transition to high school.

After witnessing the powerful messages of many senior students, I would like to close this week’s message by confidently sharing that the future is in good hands.

Advanced Placement (AP) Testing

AP Exams will commence Monday, May 2, and continue through Friday, May 13, 2022. A schedule of exams can be found [here](#). Exam dates and testing locations will also be posted near the exit of the dining hall by Monday, April 25. **Accommodations students will be notified of their exam schedule and locations via email.**

Students are required to arrive no later than 30 minutes prior to an exam start time.

If you are a student-athlete and have a school-sanctioned sporting event that conflicts with your AP exam test date(s), let me know as soon as possible so that you may be moved to late testing, which will be during the week of May 16-20, 2022. There are no other testing dates available.

Juniors and Junior Parents: Our college counseling team is pleased to announce that we are introducing a new system called *Scoir* (pronounced "score") to help you and your student navigate the college selection and application process.

All juniors have access to Scoir and we have also sent you an email invitation so that you can link to their account. **We will resend this email invitation on Monday, April 25th (the email invitation expires after 7 days).** As a parent or guardian, you will be able to view their profiles, see their college list, conduct your own college searches, and suggest colleges for your student to consider. Scoir also provides parents with financial tools so that you can get a better sense of the cost of attendance at various colleges during the selection process.

We are excited to be able to provide Scoir to our students and families, and we feel confident that you will find it helpful and easy to use. Before you get started, please take a few moments to watch the brief videos below to help you become familiar with how to use Scoir.



Health and Wellness

Given the current uptick in COVID-19 cases within our Upper School community, we want to reassure you that we're keeping a close eye on community health and our protocols. Each 'ohana must make their own decisions regarding mask use based on their unique, cumulative, health circumstances. It is important you have a discussion with your 'ohana and decide if opting in to wearing a mask is the best choice for your child(ren) while they are at school.

COVID-19 Communications

We will send COVID-19 Communication emails to the specific class, division, or group identified as needing immediate notification. Otherwise, all updates will appear in the 'COVID-19 Communications' section of the ['2021-2022 COVID-19 Plans & Information' Resource Board on myHPA](#). Students and families will always have access to this resource board to check daily, should they wish to. This decision was made in an effort to balance our commitment to transparency and accountability with COVID-19 notifications and our desire to limit the number of correspondence families receive daily that may not personally impact them.

Campus Access

During this time, campus access is limited to current students, employees, essential contractors, and approved guests — all of whom have completed a daily thermal/symptom check and a screening questionnaire.

Should a family member of a student need a meeting with a faculty, staff, or administrative team member, kindly contact them so that they can apply to have you come to campus. If approved, they will then send you a COVID-19 questionnaire. From that point, security team members will be alerted to your appointment date and time, and let you onto campus.

At the Upper School, please do not park in the Day Student Parking Lot (DSPL) and walk-in without an appointment. Similarly, at the Village Campus, kindly call or email for an appointment so that arrangements can be made. Please remember, masks are required on campus at all times when indoors. As a visitor, on either campus, you will be asked for a temperature check. Mahalo for your understanding and respect for this process.

CrisisGo for Parents

It is important that all families are set up with CrisisGo, HPA's school emergency communication tool. To set up a CrisisGo SMS/Email subscription, please click on this [invitation link](#) and complete the form by adding your name, email, and cell number (this is an important step if you would like to receive an SMS message) and click on the Subscribe button. Should an emergency occur you will be alerted by email and SMS messaging. You can also locate these instructions by logging into [myHPA](#), clicking on the resource tab, and selecting the CrisisGo Safe2SpeakUp tile.

Safe2SpeakUp for Middle and Upper Students

Similarly, Middle and Upper School students received instructions during orientation on how to upload the Safe2SpeakUp app. This is a companion app to CrisisGo. It will allow the school to alert students of emergencies and enable students to communicate with us should there be any behaviors they are concerned about.
